Mission Statement

Through an environment centered on faith, Christian service, and commitment to academic excellence, the Division of Bible and Pastoral Ministry provides a comprehensive educational experience that prepares and empowers future and current church leaders for Christian service and education in their respective or future roles.

Objective:

Through and environment that is both spiritual and academic, the Division of Bible and Pastoral Ministry seeks to provide learning opportunities that are immersed in biblical exegesis, tenets of Christianity, and the real-life application of Christian education that promote service leadership to create and cultivate servant leaders that are knowledgeable of Baptist church practices and polity and ethical leadership standards for ministry success. In addition, the program also prepares students for professional and graduate study.

The division's goals and student learning outcomes for its degree programs are carefully aligned with the mission and vision of the institution. In addition, the goals and the outcomes are linked to the curriculum and to the evaluation instruments for each course.

The student learning goals focus on broad expectations of student achievement in terms of knowledge, skills, and attitudes. The goals are supported by specific degree-program learning outcomes that address "what" faculty expect students to have successfully mastered upon the completion of a course or the degree program. Each outcome is supported by a competency-based performance measure that demonstrates "how" students will show their proficiency. Proficiency is defined by success criteria.

Goals:

- 1. Train students in a high degree of proficiency in exegetical interpretation, sermon structure, and delivery.
- 2. Train students in leadership management of Christian education, evangelism, and Christian servitude in the local church.
- 3. Prepare students thoroughly who may wish to continue their studies at the graduate level.

- 4. Students will develop an understanding of ethical, social responsibility, servant leadership, and citizenship.
- 5. Students will develop the knowledge to be relevant in their Christian service duties.
- 6. Students will develop the ability to individually and collaboratively present written and oral Christian education and church curriculum.
- 7. Students will develop a knowledge and understanding of Christianity: learn about and learn from Christian faith and life.

Student Learning Outcomes

In addition, specific student learning or course level outcomes have been developed to support the goals. Note: the course level student learning outcomes focus on the skills and knowledge students will possess upon completion of the course (what students learn).

Through coursework in the general core requirements as well as biblical studies, church doctrine, and theology, students will be able to:

- 1. Present a competency of the Bible, its canonicity, development, and its role in Christianity.
- 2. Present a competency of the biblical genres and how they fit together and exhibit the pattern, unity, and progression of the Bible.
- 3. Present a competency of church history and its implications in the role of the 21st century church community.
- 4. Present a competency of theology, its meaning and use in their personal understanding as well as how it shapes their treatment of Christian education.
- 5. Present a competency in sermon preparation and delivery in a well-developed and substantive manner.
- 6. Present a competency in church administration.
